Symposium Speakers

Lancy Carey is an economist with Washington State's Economic and Revenue Forecast Council. The Council is responsible for quarterly forecasts of the state's economy and revenue collection. Prior to this, until early 2008, he was employed as an economist with the Washington State Employment Security Department.

At the forecast council in addition to the quarterly forecasts, Lance is also responsible for producing the Annual Washington State Economic Climate Study, which tracks the state's competitiveness relative to other states according to several benchmarks.

During deer hunting season, if he is not staring at a spreadsheet, Lance can be found knee deep in mud looking for deer. Fortunately, he is a better forecaster than a hunter!

Lance graduated from Central Washington University with degrees in Economics and Finance in 2004. He lives in Shelton with his wife and three children.

Scott Bailey has served as the Southwest Washington regional labor economist for Employment Security's Labor Market and Economic Analysis branch for more than 20 years. He works closely with economic development and workforce development organizations in the region. He has done extensive research on wages in the state, and is a national trainer with the U.S. Census Bureau for the Local Employment Dynamics database.

Scott received his master's degree in economics from Portland State University. He is a board member of the Pacific Northwest Regional Economics Conference. Scott lives in Portland, Ore. with his wife, now that his kids have flown the coop. In his spare time, Scott is a public-school activist, working to improve education for all children in the Portland area.

Ignacio Marquez is the South Central area director for the Washington State Employment Security Department (ESD). Ignacio is responsible for administering ESD's programs and services in the South Central Workforce Development Area, which includes Kittitas, Yakima, Klickitat and Skamania counties. As a board member for the South Central Workforce Council, Ignacio shares the Board's

commitment to meet the workforce development needs of businesses and employers by convening industry, education and labor leaders around industryspecific issues and finding solutions to the problems identified by the partners.

Prior to his current position, Ignacio served as Employment Security's agricultural services program manager overseeing writing and analysis of federal and state legislation to formulate agency policy or position documents. He also met frequently with agency senior leadership members to give advice and report new program developments as well as consulting for the agency's position.

Ignacio is a long-time resident of the Yakima Valley. He grew up in the Wapato and Toppenish area.

Michael Broadhead has worked for Central Valley Bank for 26 years. He has been President of the bank since 1990. Central Valley Bank is the oldest community bank in Yakima Valley with strong roots that encourage growth, patronage and strength. Mike has been in banking for 40 years in Idaho and Washington state, principally in commercial and agriculture areas.

Symposium Speakers

Mike was in the Idaho National Guard from 1968 to 1974. He graduated from the University of Idaho with a Bachelor of Science Degree, majoring in agricultural economics in 1968.

Jon DeVaney has served as executive director of the Yakima Valley Growers- Shippers Association since November 2009. In this capacity, he oversees the association's data collection and reporting on the movement, holdings and marketing of tree fruit, and represents member growers and packers on legislative and regulatory issues at the local, state and federal levels.

Prior to joining the Yakima Valley Growers-Shippers Association, Mr. DeVaney served on the staff of Congressman Doc Hastings, most recently as his Policy Advisor in Washington, D.C. He also served as Washington State Director of USDA Rural Development in the Bush Administration, and on the staff of the Northwest Horticultural Council. Mr. DeVaney has a bachelor's degree from the University of Washington and a master's degree from Georgetown University.

David McFadden has served as president and CEO of the Yakima County Development Association/ New Vision, a countywide economic development agency, for more than 14 years. He has worked in the economic development arena for more than 20 years. Prior to joining New vision, he worked for the Washington State Department of Commerce and Bellingham's downtown redevelopment organization.

David has been involved heavily in recruiting new businesses to the Yakima Valley, including Wal-Mart's Distribution Center in Grandview, Northwest Horticulture in Mabton and Amtech in Wapato. He has also helped dozens of local companies with expansion projects.

David has an undergraduate degree in environmental science and a master's degree in political science, both from Western Washington University. He is a Certified Economic Developer (CED) and an Economic Development Finance Professional (EDFP).

David is married to Monique (a famous artist!) and has two highenergy daughters – Hannah and Meghan. David is

a member of Sunrise Rotary Club in Yakima and a director on the East Valley School Board. He loves to bike, garden and hike in his spare time.

Donald Meseck began his career with the Labor Market and Economic Analysis branch of the Washington State Employment Security Department in 1983. Since 1998, Don has served as a regional labor economist and currently provides monthly and yearly analysis of employment trends in Kittitas, Klickitat, Skamania, and Yakima counties. He also makes economic-update presentations to local business and government organizations, such as economic development councils, chambers of commerce, business associations, civic groups, colleges and universities throughout Central Washington.

Don earned a bachelor's degree from Alfred University, Alfred, New York in 1973; a master's degree from Pacific Lutheran University, Tacoma, Wash. in 1981; and a MBA from Pacific Lutheran University, Tacoma, Wash. in 1988. - ◆ Total travel distance from I-82 to the college campus is about 2.5 miles.


PARKING:
