An innovative approach for good opioid prescribing practices



- *ACCORDING TO THE U.S. SURGEON GENERAL, 1 IN 7 PEOPLE IN THE UNITED STATES WILL FACE SUBSTANCE ADDICTION.*
- *AN AMERICAN DIES EVERY 19 MINUTES FROM OPIOID OR HEROIN OVERDOSE.*
- *IN YAKIMA COUNTY, ABOUT HALF OF THE ROUGHLY 140 DRUG OVERDOSE DEATHS SINCE 2011 INVOLVED OPIOIDS.*

The opioid epidemic is a problem that affects all cross-sections of our communities, indifferent to language, income, ethnicity or ZIP code. In response, Virginia Mason Memorial has created an innovative program that helps primary care physicians keep better track of those receiving strong pain medications to make sure that pills aren't being overprescribed.

The program, from Memorial Physicians working with the SignalHealth analytics team, enables doctors and patients to make better plans to help deal with pain. It includes protocols that seek to:

- reduce the number of people who end up on long-term opioids
- give a shorter duration of medication for acute injuries
- put in place safety precautions, such as routine urine drug screening, checking the state registry, etc.

One of the highlights of the program was the development of a web-based chronic opioid therapy registry for primary care providers, developed in cooperation with a grant from the University of Washington. The registry captures data from the electronic medical records system and allows for multiple approaches to reporting. Medical assistants are empowered to ensure good care for these patients. This approach encompasses all VMM primary care clinic patients.

The results? In one year, all measures increased positively by 30 percent or more. "The registry has been in place for two years now, and we're very happy with the results so far, said Shawnie Haas, CEO of SignalHealth. "This is an important tool for helping patients manage pain and avoid addiction."

Because some practices have been more successful than others, guidance is provided to those with have an opportunity to improve. Pain-management appointments are scheduled based on toolkit data, and providers are having conversations with patients about opioid use.

For this innovative approach, Virginia Mason Memorial received the 2017 Washington State Hospital Association's Community Health Leadership Silver Award.

"We have to recognize (addiction) isn't evidence of a character flaw or a moral failing," said U.S. Surgeon General Vivek Murthy. "It's a chronic disease of the brain that deserves the same compassion that any other chronic illness does, like diabetes or heart disease."

bution. Thank you, Rich!

Now, you may ask, what is the Greater Yakima Chamber of Commerce? As Joe Mann described it to me, in 1893, a group of concerned citizens had an idea of a club to look after the business interests of Yakima and the surrounding area. The Commercial Club as it was called then, indeed supported local businesses. In 1903, the club incorporated by selling 500 member shares in it for approximately \$100 each (in today's value that would be \$2,400 per share). With the agreement of those 500 members, each was to pay an additional \$100 per year membership fee. The launching of marketing Yakima to the surrounding area began with this money.

In 1925, the club changed its name to the Yakima Chamber of Commerce. Through the 1940s, they worked on many projects including lobbying for better roads; pushed for the I - 90 interstate; the development of strong irrigation/horticulture laws; state fair programming; and a usable Snoqualmie Pass roadway. In the 50's and 60's, the Chamber was not only the voice of the business community, but also started work on forming the Yakima Valley Visitors and Convention Bureau.

Today, the Chamber still is a con-

sistent and loud voice of the business community. They were a major player in the All-America City designations which we won in 1994 and again 2015. In addition, the Chamber supports legislative issues through its government affairs committee that are pro-business; has helped establish the Mount Rainier National Park; supported the expansion of the White Pass Ski Area; addresses and coordinates local and regional traffic issues; hosts an annual Business & Veterans Job Fair; supports educational/leadership development through its Leadership Yakima program; provides dozens of opportunities for members to be recognized through its Business After Hours events; provides educational programs for new and established businesses; and spotlights community leaders through the Annual Chamber & Ted Robertson Community Service awards.

We are so fortunate to live in the Yakima Valley, have great people like Rich Austin and others, and have such an effective organization like the Chamber of Commerce. Take a moment and stop by to talk with them and make sure that if you are not a member - that you join today!

MEMBER PROFILE



Back in the early 1900's, commercial banks in Central Washington didn't finance home loans for individuals, making the dream of home ownership virtually impossible for most Yakima area families.

Yakima Federal Savings and Loan was founded in 1905 as a banking institution that could offer home loans and provide personal savings accounts for the growing population of Yakima.

Backed by finances from several local business owners, Yakima Federal opened its doors as Yakima Savings and Loan on June 8, 1905 in downtown Yakima,

with assets of \$15,000.

As more and more families moved into the area, home construction boomed and Yakima Federal became the go-to place for home loans.

Over the years, Yakima and Yakima Federal continued to grow. Yakima Federal added branches or merged with other Savings and Loans and today they serve customers from Pasco to Ellensburg with 10 branches. In the past 113 years Yakima Federal has paid over \$1.1 billion in interest to its savings members, and has helped finance tens of thousands of home loans.

Today Yakima Federal is the largest federally insured mutual institution in the Pacific Northwest with assets of over \$1.7 billion. They continue to offer home loans to local families, and provide a secure place for savings.

Yakima Federal has become a vital part of the communities they serve, supporting many charitable events and non-profit organizations. Over the years, they have awarded over \$2 million in college scholarships to local graduating high school seniors.

Yakima Federal is proud of its long history with the Greater Yakima Chamber of Commerce, and its history in Yakima, and looks forward to continuing to serve the residents of Central Washington for many years to come.
