I know it's true that the older we get, time seems to fly by even faster! I, also, believe that technology has changed how

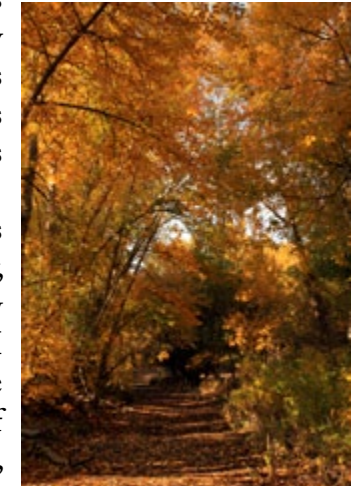

## Avoiding Embezzlement

Embezzlement can happen when opportunity, need, and justification meet. As a business owner, you can control opportunity. You can also be alert to need and justification. If

one of your organization's money-handler's personal financial situation suddenly changes, for better or worse, consider access to corporate funds. A well-developed policy manual that your organization truly references and follows can include some of the following risk management practices:

1. Check references when hiring.
2. Conduct background checks for your money handlers, even if you have known and trusted them for years.
3. Check-signers should not keep or prepare checks.
4. Require two signatures on all checks, or checks over a predetermined amount.

5. Allow no one person to have control of financial transactions.

6. Reconcile bank accounts every month, including a list of all expenditures for the month.

7. Make deposits promptly.

8. If you allow credit card use, define limits and require receipts for all purchases.

9. Create and use a standardized document for all cash handling, signed by two people.

10. Restrict online bank account use.

**The Power of Nonprofits: Stronger Together**

Why is the nonprofit sector underappreciated and what we can do about it? Despite employing over 211,000 people in Washington State and despite engaging nearly a third of all Washingtonians as volunteers, nonprofits are rarely in the discussion on increasing jobs and economic development.

Alison McCaffree, Executive Director of Washington Nonprofits, our state's nonprofit association, believes that the nonprofit sector deserves the respect and influence that it's size, diversity, resilience and economic importance show that it deserves. The nonprofit sector spans every community and political ideology and serves in areas that are essential for strong, vibrant communities but where government and business cannot or will not focus.

Nonprofit leaders, however, are rarely in the discussions on increasing jobs and economic development. Nonprofits are not seen as partners with business and government to solve the largest challenges in our communities. But it doesn't have to be this way. McCaffree will discuss what you can do to change the influence of the sector and help your own organization. She will share the latest statistics from the 2013 Nonprofits in Washington Report and what you can do to engage people in advancing your mission and the nonprofit sector as a whole.

Through advocacy efforts, nonprofits can help prevent loss of resources and lower barriers. On the positive side, they can broaden access to important services or illuminate real community needs and work with policy makers to develop a solution to address them. Find out what it means to be a "heads up" organization and how that will advance your mission. You will walk out with a new lens in which to view nonprofit priorities.

Alison McCaffree holds degrees from Stanford University and the Massachusetts Institute of Technology and an MBA from the Sloan School of Business at MIT. After starting and managing successful for-profit businesses, Alison began her nonprofit career as the Director of Knowledge Transfer for the Leaders for Global Operations program at MIT. Moving to Washington, Alison joined multiple nonprofit boards and became the Executive Director at NPower. She spent the last six years working on a book called Politics of the Possible with Mary Ellen McCaffree, a 4-term Washington State representative, an experience that gives her a unique understanding of the Washington State policy process. Over the last three years, Alison has led the planning and successful start-up of our new state association, Washington Nonprofits, a powerful agent in enhancing the health and influence of the nonprofit sector.

## Are you ready?



September is National Preparedness Month, and Pacific Power is encouraging customers to plan and prepare for natural disasters and emergencies. These steps include:

- Prepare a three-day emergency supply kit. Store these items in a watertight container: bottled water – one gallon per person per day, ready-to-eat foods and manual can opener, battery-operated radio, clock, flashlights and extra batteries, blankets and first-aid kit.

- Make a family emergency plan. Consider a plan in which each family member calls, emails or texts the same out-of-state friend or relative in the event of an emergency.

- Businesses, develop a readiness plan to ensure you and your employees are set to respond if a disaster occurs during work hours. As part of your plan, mark the location of your electrical supply panels and note how to turn off power. Your state or local government may also offer classes to get trained in community preparedness and response efforts for emergencies that may affect you.
