NEW START – Shining a Light on the Long Term Unemployed

Most of us have a friend or family member who is looking for work. A layoff can happen to anyone. In the past, a short stint into unemployment was of no great concern as there was usually a better job just around the corner. But lately, there has been a change in the dynamics of the workforce, both nationally and at the local level. The unemployed are finding it harder to find comparable work and it's taking longer...much longer.

According to the Employment Security Department, there are over 8,000 individuals in the South Central Workforce region, which covers the area from Ellensburg to White Salmon, who are now considered Long Term Unemployed (LTU). These are individuals who have been out of work for more than 27 weeks and nearly half have exhausted their unemployment benefits. Why are these individuals unemployed for such a long period of time?

The perception might be that they are not interested in working. But workforce professionals will tell you that nothing is further from the truth. This is something different and it started with the Great Recession.

As highlighted by "60 Minutes" in February 2012, they come from all demographics. They are educated professionals, skilled trade workers, business leaders and dedicated staff. They come from diverse backgrounds and have years of experience. It has been a long time since they have had to look for work so their job hunting skills may be a bit rusty... especially in this electronic era. But they are determined to find a way back anyway they can.

To help bridge the gap between these qualified job seekers and employers who are largely unaware of this resource, the South Central Workforce Development Council has been awarded part of a federal grant for a community initiative called "NEW START".

While an intensive job assistance program is a key component, the council also wants to expand partnerships with employers who will provide insight and mentorship and assist us in innovative ways to help the long term unemployed re-enter the workforce. To bring greater awareness to this issue in the weeks to come, we will be organizing formal presentations and informal roundtable discussions to business associations throughout the region.

The desire to work and contribute to our community is strong for those considered long term unemployed. Memorial: Reducing risk, improving health

Patients of Memorial Family of Services are benefitting from new technology that reduces radiation exposure when undergoing a CT scan.

Memorial is among the early adopters of this technology, as health care providers across the country seek ways to reduce radiation dose and improve patient safety. As a result, the Washington State Hospital Association has tapped Memorial as one of six hospitals to share success stories about reducing radiation dose for patients.

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"Installing SafeCT software has allowed us to reduce dose more than 50 percent without sacrificing image quality," said Dr. William Feldmann, radiologist at Yakima Valley Radiology. "Memorial embraced lowdose imaging prior to state regulatory involvement because it is best for the patient. And with SafeCT, we're able to exceed – by far – the state guidelines for patient radiation exposure."

About 60 million CT scans are performed in the United States each year. CT scans quickly and effectively diagnose problems of the head, spine, chest and abdomen. The tests allow physicians to make timely and accurate diagnoses that save lives, but they have raised concerns in recent years about repeated or prolonged exposure to radiation for patients.

Everyone is exposed to radiation naturally in daily life, primarily from cosmic radiation and radon gas. One CT scan is equivalent to one to three years of natural background radiation. CT scans account for half of all medical radiation exposure, and while the risks are very low, physicians, hospitals and engineers are continually striving to lower radiation dose and risk.

States across the country, including Washington, are looking at instituting regulations governing radiation exposure for patients. In the meantime, the Washington State Hospital Association is working with hospitals statewide to try to develop best practices in dose reduction, among other areas.

In August, Memorial adopted new software technology that allows for dose to be reduced during a CT scan, while still achieving a usable image for a radiologist. The benefits to



patients are three-fold: improved technology without a cost increase to the patient, higher quality images for the radiologist to read, and a radiation dose reduction of up to 60 percent when compared to exams done a year earlier.

"Knowing that my patients, particularly those that require repeated scans, are being exposed to less radiation gives me peace of mind," said Dr. Sean Cleary, a radiation oncologist at North Star Lodge. "Reducing the health risks to our patients is paramount."

Memorial isn't stopping with the latest in CT technology. Memorial recently installed a new, \$2 million 3 Tesla MRI scanner, allowing patients to avoid traveling to Seattle, Spokane or the Tri-Cities for a high-field strength MRI. This next generation MRI enhances image detail and quality, improving care and service for our patients.

Powerhouse and providing a functional volunteer bathroom in the Car Barn as we work to restore and expand this world class tourist attraction. Our own volunteers are currently completing the Car Barn bathroom plumbing and painting bathroom walls.

John Stainsby, manager of RSD, made his "In Kind" contribution by offering a very significant discount on major HVAC equipment needed to provide gas heat and A/C in the Powerhouse. Completion of this project will allow us to rent the Powerhouse for special occasions which will include a ride on

one of our circa 1928 electric trolleys.

Although we were not in need of the uniform and laundry services, Cintas supplied the labor of company employees. On June 17th, four Cintas employees spent the day removing trees, vines and weeds which had overgrown a potential storage area. We are now searching for heavy duty shelving for placement in the cleaned area. When this project is completed, rails, heavy rail parts, ties, etc. that are now scattered

around the rail yard will be organized and fork lifted onto the shelving. Our goal here is to provide an uncluttered rail yard which will enable visitors to safely view the vintage rolling stock parked there.

We were faced with the need to purchase a tow behind generator car which powers the trolley on lines where have stolen thieves copper trolley wire and we were unable to come up with the \$30,000 for the purchase. Issaquah Trolley made an "In contribution Kind" and sold Yakima Valley Trolleys a quality used generator for \$800.00!

Our volunteers are currently mounting the unit on our small tow behind cart which will enable us to offer the Selah round trip trolley ride. Eagle Machine provided \$850.00 in labor and material needed to construct a custom engine to generator adaptor used on a tow behind generator.

Toppenish Railroad Museum provided expertise and labor as they helped our volunteers replace a damaged rail on a Yakima city street. Their volunteers have helped Yakima Valley Trolleys many times in the past.

Thank you to all of these organizations

which were able to assist us as we work toward expanding vintage trolley service into the downtown core. Connecting the Convention Center (and surrounding hotels) to the proposed plaza, downtown wineries, our Historic District, our Electric Rail Museum, and Selah will improve our quality of life and dramatically increase tourism. While showcasing an important part of our heritage, these vehicles will allow us to set us apart from other Eastern Washington competing for the millions of tourism dollars passing by Yakima every week.
